Overview of Sprint Board Types

- This guide is provided for easier reference to know the different ways you can structure the Sprint Board.
- There is no hard and fast rule about which one you should pick. It really boils down to the individual project requirements.
- The bare minimum is to have 3 columns - ToDo, Doing, Done.
- You can also structure your own Sprint Board.

Sprint Board Type 1: Basic

- A simple layout with the most basic columns that are also mandatory for a Sprint Board.

ToDo	Doing	Done

Sprint Board Type 2: Basic with Story

- A simple layout with the most basic columns for stories having sub tasks.
- Each story has 1 or more tasks that needs to be completed.
- Most of the Enterprise Sprint Boards are of this type.

Story	ToDo	Doing	Done

Sprint Board Type 3: Basic with Testing

- A simple layout with required columns along with a column for testing progress.
- Useful when you want to give importance to test the story with acceptance tests or test cases.

ToDo	Doing	To Verify	Done

Sprint Board Type 4: Cross Team

- A simple layout with the Done criteria achieved through two steps - developer marks as Resolved and the tester marks it as Closed if all test passes.
- This layout is useful when you are working across the teams who are in same or different location.

ToDo	Doing	Resolved	Closed

Sprint Board Type 5: Story with Sub Tasks

- This layout contains Story along with its sub tasks.
- Also, it includes verification or testing stage that needs to be completed before marking it as Closed.
- This layout gives more control over individual state of the items.
